

On Septtember 13th. during the Annual Bluegrass Festival held at Franklin, Ohio the Third Carter Stanley Memorial Award will be presented. I am proud to have been selected chairman of the committee and will present the trophy to an outstanding artist who has contributed much to the field of bluegrass music as did Carter Stanley.

Fay McGinnis, president of the Stanley Brothers Fan Club and now president of the Ralph Stanley club tells me that last year many who loved Carter and bluegrass music felt neglected because they were not personally invited to contribute a donation to help make the award trophy really what it so justly deserves to be. This memorial award not only symbolizes Carter Stanley's work, talent, and entertainment he gave to the world but also serves as a yearly reminder to fans and musicians that bluegrass music will never die. This award is highly recommended by the Country Music Association of Nashville, Tennessee, and I know I can speak for the first two recipients, Ralph Stanley and Bill Monroe that the award is one never to be forgotten.

POP ECKLER, Ex-MUSICAN. VICTIM (Covington, Ky. March 23 1970) CAR

Garner (Pop) Eckler, 64, former country and western singer and composer of "Money Marbles and Chalk", was killed Saturday when he was run down by an automobile near his home.

Eckler, who retired in 1950 from music and went to work as a fireman for the Louisville & Nashville Railroad, sang on radio stations in Cincinnati, Ohio, Allanta Ga., and New York City.

He began his career with Roland Gaines, also of Kentucky as the Yodeling Twins, later he formed a band billed as "Pop Eckler and the Young uns".

Covington police charged the driver of Covington with drunk and reckless driving.

Jimmy Monroe and Rual Yarbrough were hore for a day and night, we enjoyed the time spent with them also.

Anyway, about me...I was born in Baltimore on 4/1/44/.I have lived in Harve de Grace all my life.W A S A is a family owned station started by my father, Jasson T. Pate, now deceased, in 1948. My true career in radio started when I was about five when Daddy would take me up to the station on Sunday mornings and let me and my sisters sing nursery rhymes over the air. We did this once or twice. Since then I have done everything from cutting grass to getting my fingers in the management and programing.

I am a graduate of American University of Washington D.C. and have a degree in personal management. I am in the process of completing work for a Master's Degree from George Washington University in Management Enganeering. As I said I teach school, 8th. grade English and Social Studies, at Aberdeen Junior High School, and am certified as a teacher. Work at the radio station is done in the early morning, evening,

and on weekends.

As for my intrest in old time music, Alex and Ola Belle and the New River Boys got their professional start as a brother-sister team on W A S A and played there from 1948-58. I can remember setting on Ola's lap as she and Alex did their show. In 1963 I started really studying and investigating mountain music and have been aided in this considerably by Ola. My program has been on the air for four years now and features the old time songs.

I am married to the former Joyce Farrington who is from West Jefferson, N.C. I have an extremely slight musical talent as I can play a little on the "banjer" and guitar. I have also written several old time songs with the aid of Ola and her husband

Bud, but have not had any of these recorded or published.

As far as W A S A is concerned, I guess I'd best mention this...the station is run and has been since my father's death in 1962 by my mother, Irs. Virginia Pate, who currently is president-elect of the American Women in Radio and Television and will become president of the organization in London this spring.

A group of boys that really enjoy pickin' and singin' bluegrass music is a band from Bristol, Tenn., known as Gerald and Ray and the Bluegrass Partners. The band consists of the following people: Gerald Church-guitar, Ray Jones-banjo, Tom Hagy-mandolim, also MC for the group, R.B. Cross-fiddle and Luther Pennington-bass. Luther is also known as Cousin Milkweed, the comdeian for the group when they preform a good clean show for the entire family wheather it be for a social event, civic group, club, or any otherwent.

These boys have been organized about two years, in this time they have come a

long way up the ladder of success.

Last year they won three bluegrass contests, one held at Advolf, Va. The Bluegrass Partners (then known as the Starlight Mountain Boys) won first place over 28 other bands, the prize being 1000 free records. Also in local talent contests, they were selected as the best bluegrass act.

They can be heard on radio station W B B I Abingdon, Va. each Sat. afternoon from 2-2:20. They appeared for a year and a half on the Virgil Q.Wacks show on Channel 11 Johnson City, Tenn. and on channel 5, Bristol, Tenn., on the C.M.Taylor Parade of Quartets Show, preforming some good gospel bluegrass music. They have also made

guest appreances on channel 6 at Bluefield, W.Va.

On March 21, 1970, the band participated in the Fiddler's Convention in Denver, N.C. and were proud that their mandoilin player won second place in the mandoiln contest. They have also appeared at conventions held at Galax, Va. Fillsville, Va., and Union Grove.N.C. Their fiddle player has appeared at the National Folk Festival in Knoxville, Tenn.

They have recently worked shows at the Lonesome Valley Jamboree in Kingsport. Tenn. with such artists as Ralph Stanley and The Clinch Mountain Boys. and the Country Gent-Luen, a fantastic group out of Washington D.C. and the number one gospel singer,

Carl Story.

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THE INTERNATIONAL RALPH STANLEY FAN CLUB NEWSLETTER THE STANLEY STANDARD SHOW REPORT BERRYSVILLE, VA. FESTIVAL JULY 305 1970

I am writing to report on my visit to the bluegrass festival July 4-5 1970 in Berrysville, Va. I have no idea if any other member will be reporting on this festival, but if so, the more the better. Perhaps others will have a different analysis or

mention some things that I may overlook.

I arsose in the wee hours on Sat. July 4 and was on the way before 5 AM. Five hours and 275 miles later, I arrived in Winchester, Va. at 10AM, checked into my prevously reserved motel, then proceeded to Berrysville and Watermelon Park, location of the festival. The crowd was already hugh, but I managed to locate my folding chain not too far from the stage. I should mention that I went stag, as my wife is not much of a bluegrass lover. Knowing my feelings for bluegrass, she did not protest too much over my going, and spent the weekend visiting her father.

After watching & listening to the music for awhile, I decided to look for Ralph and the boys. I found their bus parked near the river, with Ralph and Curly Ray siting there on that hot day contemplating jumping into the water to cool off. I had wondered if I might meet you and Roy there for the first time, but Ralph advised me that he had seen you the previous weekend and that the distance was too far for you to make it this time. After chating with the boys awhile Iheaded back to my chair

to watch the festival, as the music was continous untill midnight.

I will take a moment to fill my thoughts about the park. The sound system was excellent. Wu could hear equally well wheather you were near the stage or farback in the crowd, and even well out into the distant parking areas. He many laege trees a enable most people to sit in the shade, thus making the heat a bit more bearable. The food on sale left much to be desired, but many of the better prepared people came with their own food in baskets & coolers, A new rest room building built since the previous festival was a welcome addition.

The festival attendance was tremendous, reports eatimated it at near 6000 people

both Sat. and Sun.

For a bluegrass fan making his first festival visit, this was an unforgettable thrill for me. The multitude of talent assembled there was overwhelming. I will not attempt to mention every group who performed, but will highlight some of my impress-

ions about various groups.

I can't think of any band to mention first other than Ralph and the Clinch Mt. Boys. After about 3 hours of music by various groups on Sat. Ralph and the boys made their first appreance of the day, and were the first band of the day to be applauded back onto stage for an encore. The usual superlatives are not needed here, all journal readers know how great this band is. Let me add my personal opinion here that, in Roy Lee Centers, Ralph has brought the finest talent possible into the band. L liked Larry Sparks, but Roy Lee just has the perfect voice to blond in with the Stanley sound.

Don Reno and Bill Harrell were in their usual fine form, and the return of Red

Smiley with the group was tremendous to see.

At the time of the festival, the team of Emerson and Waldron had only recently split up. Cliff Waldron is now with the Shenandoah Valley Cut-ups, while Bill is back with the Country Gentlmen: both excellent groups.

On the other side of the ledger, a group I could have done without was the Bluegrass Alliance. Their style seemed more folk than bluegrass. The same opinion applies

for Roger and Joan Sprung.

A relatively new or unknown group who played some fine bluegrass was Randall Collins, Curtis Blackwell and the Dixie Bluegrass Boys. Curtis Blackwell at one time was a lead singer for Bill Monroe. I predict that in the near future Collins and Blackwell will be rated among the top bluegrass groups in the nation. I personally rate them there right now.

BERRYSVILLE SHOW REPORT CONTINUED

The Osborne Brothers, despite their plugged-in electric sound, were big favorites with the crowd. One thing very noticeable was that the young set between the ages of 7-15, called for recent Osborne material such as "Rocky Top" while the 25 and up age group were requesting the older tunes like "Once More".

The old master, Bill Monroe, was great as always. It seems that no matter who he has in his band, they quickly develop into an excellent group. James Monroe is imp roving each time I see him, and will undoubtdly carry on the Bill Monroe sound when his

father retires in some distant year.

Sunday morning at the festival featured three hours of gospel or sacred music and songs, with all groups taking turns for about 20 minutes each. The beautiful weather and cooler tempatures Sunday created a nice setting for this part of the festival.

The hightlight of the final four hours to close out the fostival on Sunday afternoon was the Bluegrass Story, or more aptly entitled "The Bill Monroe Story". This segment was narrated by festival promoter, Carlton Haney, and had Bill Monroe playing and singing with many persons who had worked with him over the years. I will not even attempt to name everyone, but it was a real thrill to see various durts or trice performing togather, such as Monroe, Ralph Stanley and Don Reno togather; or the three fiddle players Tater Tate, Chubby Wise and Kenny Baker, or Monroe, Lac diseman, or Monroe and Jimmy Martin, and other combinations of talent.

Only at a festival like this are such great moments possible.

The banjo is an instrument which, since about 1850, has been living quite an amazing life. Until 1876 when the Stewart Thoroughbred model came out of the workshop and more or less defined the instrument, the banjo was in an amorphous state. Many, if not most, were created by hand in any image the maker had in his mind. The most important reason for the growing popularity of the banjo in these early days was, in my opinion, that it is, barring drums, the simplest instrument to make oneself, requiring only the simplest tools and a relatively small amount of accuracy. The second most important reason for popularity in the early days-but definitely the most important now, is the sound of the instrument. There is no mistaking the sound of the banjo. I remember reading several years ago that the banjo was the first instrument to be recorded for posterity. All attempts to alter the sound of the banjo, no matter how much ingenuity was involved, have failed. Mandolin banjos, guitar banjos, banjo ukeleles, piccolo banjos, bass banjos and lately, even 12 string banjos, have all only emphasized that a banjo is a banjo is a banjo is a banjo is a banjo.

I think that the extremes in variation during the life span of the banjo can be placed at four equidistant corners of a diamond. At the top is the present "Mid-century banjo mania," and at the bottom, the slump and disinterest from 1930 until the mid-forties. At the left, we find the "fancy" styles produced by Van Eps and Earl Scruggs and at the right corner, the jazz and minstrel styles involving a flat pick and a very limber right wrist, employed by Ed Peabody and Johnny St. Cyr.

A shining demonstration of classical banjo technique was given at the Newport Folk Festival this summer during a banjo workshop that Marshall Brickman and I were moderating. The banjoist was Paul Cadwell, a grey-locked gentlemen who has been playing the banjo for 60 years. His incredibly nible fingers flitted over the nylon-fishing-line-strings in marches, mazurkas and polkas and the large audience unanimously greeted Paul and the end of his music with a standing ovation, which most certainly attests to the fact that it is indeed a very exciting style.

The opposite of this classical style is, of course, the tenor banjo style used primarily in jazz bands for rhythm. A tribute and proof that the tenor banjo is a great rhythm instrument can be found in the makeup of jazz-band sections. Many Dixieland bands had no drums if there was a banjo present to give the percussive rhythm. A prime example of this situation is Turk Murphy's band. Turk fronts a two-beat style "didie band" out of San Francisco, and for many years had no drums. He had such a strong rhythm section with bass, piano and banjo that it was only recently that he added a drummer, who was testeful enough to merely emphasize the rhythmic paterns of the banjo.

I am in no way an expert in this style of banjo playing, but there are a couple of things I have noticed. If the banjo does take a solo and play a chorus or two the melody is kept on the first string, which often makes for some interestingly and wierdly shaped chords. It is my contention that the right hand makes the music on stringed instruments, and this becomes apparent when one realizes that the excitement on the tenor banjo, and there can be plenty of it, comes from the intricate cross-rhythms and speed of the tremplo in conjunction with good control of the pick, all accoutrements of the right hand. Listen to "Black Bottom Stomp" by Jelly Roll Morton's Red Hot Peppers. Johnny St Cyr, one of the altime great banjoists and guitarists, takes a great break. (Folkways # FP63, Jazz Volume 5).

The closest resemblance to tenor banjo style that we can find in five string techniques is in what has been termed "Seeger Style", which is the essiest way to differentiate it from "Scruggs Style." The main difference between Seeger and tenor style is that on the five string we use no flat pick. Speed is there, cross rhythms are definitely there and melody is there, often on the first string. The best Seeger picking I can think of was done by Pete on his first Folkways album called "Darling Corey." Also, the "Cumberland Mountain Bear Chase, "on Charter. You'll have to do a lot of hunting for the Charter album, but it will be worth it. Other fine picking closest to Seeger style was done by Dick Weissman on a records called "Banjos, Banjos, and more Banjos" on the Judson label, recently reissued as "Five String Banjo Jamboree on Washington. Dick is wonderfully fast, accurate and imaginative, and he uses his thumb a lot more than Pet does. I think I can interject a word to banjo players in their "formative years": no matter what five string style you prefer, sooner or later you will realize and accept the fact that the thumb is the most active finger. I started playing the banjo when I was nine, and for four years I played nothing but Seeger style since he was the only banjo player I had ever heard. Neither did I move my thumb off the fifth string since there was nobody around to tell me to do so. At thirteen I got my first aural taste of Scruggs picking and learned it as best I could from records. I found that there were many, many things I couln't duplicate exactly and it wasn't until four or so years later, when I saw someone good play Scruggs style, (Don Reno, ironically) that I realized that you've got to get that thumb to socialize with the other fingers on what is primarily their strings. If there are any guitar players reading this instant banjo manual, the more advanced, who play "Travis style" will attest to the fact that the thumb is the most active finger there also, simulating a bass, giving the kick to the rhythm and playing a lot of melody notes, too. I wish now that I hadn't played eight years before I saw the light illuminating my thumb. Believe me, it took a lot of unlearning to get the thumb off the drone string and start making music. While on the subject of neglected fingers, I feel I should say something about the black sheep of the left hand-the right finger. I never had trouble using this finger when and wherever I wanted, but having watched many young and eager banjoists I have noticed that most have trouble controlling it, and use it only when absolutely necessary. You'll be doing yourself and people who have to listen to you a favor if you get that finger used to playing notes, instead of waiving it passibely above the fingerboard. A very nice C7 chord can be gotten as follows: G tuning, barre with the first finger on the fifth fret, little finger 1st string, 8th fret and ring finger third string7th fret. Naturally, being a barre chord it can be used anywhere on the neck, but sounds the best in the middle range. Deft use of the ring finger will makt it easy to stretch for chords otherwise unattainable. Try this: C tuning. Middle finger 4th string 4th fret, index finger 3rd string 3rd fret, right finger 2nd string 5th fret, and little finger 1st string 7th fret. Believe it or not, this is a kind of C7 chord and the chord to follow it should be an F major one. If you like the Chord and want to use it in G tuning move the middle finger to the fifth fret.




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
